HINARI Access to Research in Health programme provides free or very low-cost online access to up to 35 000 information sources in biomedical and related social sciences to local, non-profit institutions in developing countries. HINARI was launched in 2002 and is one of the world's largest collections of biomedical and health literature. Currently, there are more than 5 700 institutions in more than 100 eligible countries, areas and territories registered for HINARI. During 2013, users at these institutions downloaded over 7.5 million articles and book chapters.

BACKGROUND

HINARI was developed in the framework of the Health InterNetwork, introduced by the United Nations' Secretary General Kofi Annan at the UN Millennium Summit in 2000. Led by WHO, HINARI aims to strengthen public health services by providing public health workers, researchers and policymakers access to high-quality, relevant and timely health information, via the Internet. HINARI works collaboratively with 160 scientific/technical and medical partner publishers within the context of the Research4Life partnership that includes other online information delivery programmes: AGORA² (Access to Global Online Research in Agriculture) led by the FAO, OARE³ (Access to Research in the Environment) led by UNEP, and ARDI (Access to Research for Development and Innovation) led by WIPO⁴. This collaboration between the agriculture, environmental, health and innovation sectors is resulting in efficient systems development and collaborative training and outreach.

HINARI CONTENT

The information resources cover the subjects of basic science, biochemistry, biotechnology, cardiology, clinical medicine, dentistry, education, environmental sciences, ethics, general medicine, geriatrics, HIV/AIDS, immunology, infectious diseases, microbiology, nursing/allied health, nutrition, OB/GYN, oncology, parasitology, pediatrics, social sciences, surgery, toxicology, tropical medicine, and zoology.

THE HINARI SYSTEM

HINARI offers a simple and effective user interface over the web, serving as a gateway to full-text journal articles and e-books at Publisher Partners' websites. HINARI users can use search and access full-text articles available through HINARI directly from the PubMed (Medline) database. WHO is responsible for management and maintenance of all functions of the HINARI website, with the support of Yale University Library.

ELIGIBILITY FOR HINARI

Local, not-for-profit institutions in two groups of countries, areas or territories may register for access to the publications through HINARI. The country lists are based on four factors: Total GNI and GNI per capita (World Bank figures), United Nations Least Developed Country (LDCs) List and Human Development Index (HDI). Institutions in countries, areas and territories that match the relevant criteria may be eligible for free access or access for a fee of US \$1 000 per year. (See lists of countries, areas and territories below). Individual publisher partners may customize the list of countries for their content each year.

Eligible categories of institutions are: national universities, research institutes, professional schools (medicine, nursing, pharmacy, public health, and dentistry), teaching hospitals, government offices and national medical libraries. All staff members and students are entitled to have access to the information resources.

OUTREACH AND TRAINING

Capacity building and outreach are critical components of the HINARI programme, which ensure that individuals in participating organizations can access and use HINARI effectively. The partners supporting the development of HINARI, AGORA, OARE and ARDI are conducting "train-the-trainers" workshops at regional, national and sub-national levels. The training materials are diverse and include modules on the programmes' journals, as well as Authorship skills; Evidence based practice, e-Books, Information literacy. There are also HINARI User Training Video Series.
